INTRODUCTION

SERMON REFLECTION

Read: Psalm 146:7-9, Luke 4:18-19, 2 Corinthians 5:17-21, Luke 19:1-10

Overview: Kingdom justice is the mission of the church. From the first moments of Christ's public ministry, he declared that his mission was to set things right for everyone. In our day, justice has many different meanings and applications and is used for different agendas. We can't have justice without Jesus and we cannot have Jesus without Justice.

Reflect:

- Describe a time when you experienced an injustice.
- Have you worked for justice on behalf of someone? If so, describe what that was like.
- Answer the question from this statement, "Justice is the theme that runs throughout the Scriptures from beginning to end. It is what God is doing through Jesus to restore creation to its original intent: Humans living in harmony with God and with each other. The Bible calls the state of this human condition, Shalom, the way things are supposed to be. This, though, is not the way things are. How did we get here?"
- Based on the sermon, how do you understand "sinful systems of unrighteousness"? What are some examples today?
- How can you fight against "sinful systems of unrighteousness" today? How can CG Midtown?
